Training Programme – The crew training programme has taken a bit of a hit this month due to the adverse weather not playing ball with our training days.

ST 1502 Coding Programme – 'Clankies' Shiner and Tony along with 'Leckies' Chris and Eddie have made a start on the coding programme but the majority of the work is now held pending release of funding for the material necessary to bring her up to full compliance.


October.

and dozens of yards of rope being turned out,




most of which ended up being spliced by xxxxxxx the Warrior's sail maker. I cannot mention everyone by name for which

FMD Dainty – This boat has moved on in the month by virtue of Chris H, Shiner, Fred and in no small way Ricky. She has been rubbed down several times now with lots of intermediate filling and fairing prior to priming and undercoating.

Fred and Ricky had a go at setting up her hull so that her waterline could be scribed accurately.

Above right Ricky is setting up the hull horizontal in



both planes. They thought that it would be a good exercise to use the old 'Water in a hose pipe'

method, 'cos we all know that water will always find its own level and no matter what you do with the hose pipe between the two ends the water level will



be the same at each end. Above right Ricky is checking his end of the pipe as Fred tops it up at the other. The theory is that once filled to the correct level, Ricky then just walks around the boat marking off the water level at his end on the boat and 'hey presto' you have a perfect waterline!!!!!.

What they don't tell you is that you have to watch out for airlocks or you are in danger of defying the laws of physics



and it is case of a judicious 'suck and blow' and if you are not careful you can experience a severe case of the 'Water Boarding' torture. Watch this space for future developments once they have dried up all of the spilled water and dried out their shoes and socks. Above right shows the boat after a lot of fairing and a couple of coats of undercoat. Her final coat will be Arctic Blue as donated by the Dainty Association.

Ariadne Restoration Programme – Work on Ariadne is now in full flow and has been attracting a full complement of volunteers. In the following photos you can see Tony H, Dave R and Eddie getting to grips with some of her filling, fairing and fettling. Also guilty in the month are Eddie, John
